"The Advent Virus: Catch It!"

Advent is a season of waiting, expecting, and hoping. Beginning four Sundays prior to Christmas and ending on Christmas Eve, Advent helps us prepare for the coming, or "advent," of the Christ child at Christmas. (The word "advent" comes from the Latin word that means "coming.") For many centuries, Christians have used an Advent wreath to inspire their hopes for the coming of Christ. By lighting candles and reading Bible verses, we are reminded about the meaning of Christ's birth and become more excited about his com-



ing in the past, in the future, and in our own lives. There is no set meaning for the candles of the Advent wreath (except for the middle candle, which always signifies the birth of Jesus the Christ and is often called the Christ Candle), but for the most part, the candles point to the themes of peace, hope, joy, and love. In addition to this, Advent wreaths employ candles with a variety of colors. Traditionally, the wreath uses three purple or blue candles, one pink candle, and one white candle in the middle. The purple (or blue) candles remind us of how serious and solemn God's people have been in waiting for the Messiah. The pink candle signifies the joy of our waiting. The white is triumphant and celebrative because Christ is born.

With this in mind, I recently came across an entertaining and informative piece about the meaning of Advent entitled, "The Advent Virus." It goes like this: Warning! Be on the alert for The Advent Virus. Its symptoms include an abundance of inner Hope, Peace, Joy and Love. The hearts of a great many have already been exposed to this virus, and it is possible that people everywhere could come down with it in epidemic proportions. This could pose a serious threat to what has, up to now, been a fairly stable condition of conflict in the world.

Other signs and symptoms of "The Advent Virus" include the following:

An unmistakable ability to enjoy each moment.

A loss of interest in judging other people.

A loss of interest in interpreting the actions of others.

A loss of interest in conflict.

A loss of the ability to worry. (This is a very serious symptom.)

Frequent, overwhelming episodes of appreciation.

Contented feelings of connectedness with others.

Frequent attacks of smiling.

An increasing tendency to let things happen rather than make them happen.

An increased susceptibility to the love extended by others as well as the uncontrollable urge to extend it.

Dear friends, while I pray that we all have a safe and healthy holiday season, I hope we all get this "holy" illness called, "the Advent virus"!

What happens when the children have received their shoebox gifts?


After the children receive their shoebox gifts, many are invited back to participate in a discipleship program – 'The Greatest Journey.' It is a 12-lesson course where children come to know Christ, grow in faith, and learn how

to share the Gospel with others.

After completing the course, the children attend a graduation celebration and receive a certificate. Most importantly, they are given a Bible that includes the New Testament and selected Old Testament stories – written in the child's native language. Since 2010, more than 11 million children have enrolled in The Greatest Journey course. Nearly 8 million have graduated and 5 million of them have made decisions for Christ.

Update on Damage to Chapel By Hurricane Irma

For some at Chapel by the Sea, memories of the devastation from hurricane Charlie are still fresh, but we raise our voices to God and thank Him for the grace He has shown us today. The Finance/Stewardship Committee wanted to take a moment to update the congregation as to the status of the repairs and associated costs from Irma. As of this writing, all the damages caused by hurricane Irma have been repaired. As reported previously, the deductible for our wind insurance policy is \$28,500. Our total cost was \$33,000 and, therefore, it was not prudent to process a claim. We also did not qualify for disaster assistance from the Peace River Presbytery. However, God has and will continue to provide. Through the generous donations of our members, friends and visitors, we were able to cover our hurricane related expenses. Contributions ranged from \$25 up to \$19,500. Thank you, Chapel community!

Saving Taxes with Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)

Are you at least age $70\frac{1}{2}$, have an IRA and take the standard deduction on your tax return (i.e., you do not itemize)? If so, the following tax-savings idea should be of interest to you. Each year required minimum distributions (RMDs) must be made to persons age $70\frac{1}{2}$ and older from non-Roth IRAs. When these distributions are made to you directly they must be reported as taxable income on line 15b of Form 1040. If you take the standard deduction and do not itemize, then contributing some or all of these RMDs to a qualified charity cannot be used to offset your RMD income.

However, you can avoid taxation on up to \$100,000 of RMD income each year with the use of a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). This is done by instructing your IRA custodian to make a direct transfer of funds to a qualified charity (e.g., Chapel by the Sea). You will pay no taxes on this distribution because it is excluded from your taxable income (although reported on line 15a of Form 1040 as an IRA distribution, a QCD is not reported as taxable income on line 15b).

Using a QCD will also lower your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI). This can help you avoid the Medicare high-income surcharge, which boosts your Part B and Part D premiums if your modified AGI is more than specified amounts. Keeping the money out of your AGI might also reduce the amount of your taxable Social Security benefits.

To take advantage of a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) the funds must be transferred by your custodian directly to the qualified charity, you cannot accept payment. And this must be done before the end of the tax year. If this tax-savings idea is of interest to you, don't delay, contact your tax advisor or custodian today.
