

"Oh, That You Would Bless Me..."

I Chronicles 4:9-10

I Chronicles 4:10 says, "Jabez cried out to the God of Israel, 'Oh, that you would bless me and enlarge my territory! Let your hand be with me and keep me from harm so that I will be free from pain.' And God granted his request."



"Oh, that you would bless me..." is the first part of Jabez's prayer. Many times, we think that it is selfish to ask God to bless us personally, but in actuality, it's not. Let's explore this more closely with a "Question" and "Answer" format.

Q: What is a "blessing"?

A: We use the words "bless" or "blessing" regularly and without much thought. We ask God to bless our families, friends, and so forth. We ask God to "bless" our food before we eat. When someone sneezes, we might say, "God bless you!" But what does blessing really mean? To bless in the biblical sense means "to ask for or to impart supernatural favor." We are asking for God's favor when we ask for God's blessings.

Q: Is it okay to ask God for blessings?

A: Yes! But we must make sure we ask with the right motives and attitude. James 4:3 says, "When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with the wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures." So, make sure that whatever you ask for will edify your relationship with God, and not encourage more greediness in our already materialistic leanings.

Q: What are we to do with God's blessings when we receive them?

A: Enjoy them for they are God's gifts to you, but even more so, share them with others. We are to freely share God's blessings, particularly in the form of our time, talents, and treasures, with others, including friends, family and fellow church members, but also complete strangers and even enemies.

In his book, *The Prayer of Jabez*, Dr. Bruce Wilkinson relates the fable about a Mr. Jones who dies and goes to heaven. The Apostle Peter is at the gates waiting for him to give him a tour. Mr. Jones sees the splendor of the golden streets, beautiful mansions, and angel choirs. And as the tour continues, he notices an odd-looking building, curiously out of place in the midst of all of the beauty. It is an enormous warehouse, with no windows and only one door. Mr. Jones tells Peter he wants to look inside, but Peter hesitates, saying, "You really don't want to see what's in there."

The tour goes along, but Mr. Jones' mind keeps wandering back to that warehouse. He keeps bugging Peter, and so Peter finally takes him back to the mysterious warehouse. Upon entering the building, Mr. Jones notices that the building is filled with row after row of shelves, floor to ceiling, each neatly stacked with white boxes tied in red ribbons. He also notices that each box has a name on it, so he turns to Peter and asks, "Do I have one? Peter then replies, "Yes, you do, but..." However, before Peter could even finish his reply, Mr. Jones is already dashing toward the "J" aisle to find his box. Peter follows, shaking his head. He catches up with Mr. Jones just as he's slipping the red ribbon off his box and popping the lid. Looking inside, Jones has a moment of instant recognition, and then he lets out a deep sigh like the ones Peter has heard so many times before.

Because there in Mr. Jones' white box were all the blessings that God wanted to give to him while he was on earth...but Mr. Jones had never asked for!

Friends of Chapel by the Sea, don't let this happen to you! Clean out your "white box"! Jesus says in Matthew 7 to ask and it will be given to you. James says we do not have because we do not ask. Again, is it right to ask God for blessings? Yes, but ask with the right attitude and with the intention of not only enjoying God's blessings but, most importantly, sharing them with others.

ECHO is excited to host its 26th annual International Agriculture Conference November 19-21. This conference serves to connect development workers who serve small-scale farmers and work to alleviate the challenges of world hunger. The International Conference, held annually in Fort Myers, FL, regularly attracts delegates from over 30 countries. Each year, with the help of churches and volunteers like you, ECHO is able to provide meals at no cost for conference delegates, thus keeping the cost of attendance affordable. As in years past, Chapel will provide salads and desserts for a closing luncheon on

Friday, November 22 for staff and volunteers. The Mission & Outreach Committee will prepare the food on Thursday, November 21. In 2016, approximately 815 million people were hungry worldwide. Most of these individuals live in Asia and Africa. In the same year, 5.6 million children under the age of 5 died, about 15,000 every day. Poor nutrition caused nearly half of these deaths. 101 million or 16% of children under age 5 were underweight around the world in 2011. Approximately 462 million adults are underweight worldwide. In developing countries today, around 45% of deaths of children under age 5 are directly linked to undernutrition. Nearly 11% of the world's population suffers from chronic undernourishment.

Presbyterian Hunger Program Food Week of Action ~ October 13 – 21, 2019



We envision a world where everyone has enough affordable, healthy and culturally appropriate food where no one is hungry and where we fairly compensate, respect and celebrate those who work in the food chain.

The purpose of the Food Week of Action is to raise awareness about hunger and its underlying causes, and to motivate people to take action on local and national concerns. There is great need across the globe for more equitable and ecological food and farms systems, which will bring communities closer to food sovereignty and with more control over seeds and land. - Give thanks for the food you eat.
- Eat food grown as close as possible to where you live.
- Strive for all people to have knowledge about and access to affordable, nutritious food.

- Be grateful to those who grow and prepare food for your table.
- Support fair wages for farmworkers, farmers and food workers.
- Reduce the environmental damage of land, water and air from food production and the food system.
- Protect the biodiversity of seeds, soils, ecosystems and the cultures of food producers.
- Rejoice and share the sacred gift of food with all.



Apple Sunday & October Birthdays






